Impact

- Pupils have greater ownership of their own learning as they know what they need to do to improve their work themselves.
- Increased pupil confidence in lessons with a higher proportion of independent working.
- Gap narrowing across the curriculum for pupil premium pupils. 2013-14 data shows a higher value added score at the end of key stage 2 for pupil premium pupils compared to other pupils in reading and mathematics, and an equal score in writing.
- Improved ICT skills prepare pupils well for the present and future stages of their education.
- Access to a high quality music curriculum supports self-esteem, confidence and inclusivity.
- Free access to a variety of sports clubs enables children to participate in a sport that they may not otherwise have the opportunity to do.
- Parent confidence in helping their children with school worked increased, and family stress reduced through access to school support and, or signposted to multi agency support from school.
- Access to residentials where pupils engage in a range of outdoor education activities including: gorge walking, coast hopping, kayaking and sailing, leading to increased self-esteem, self-confidence, team work skills and experiencing a sense of 'awe and wonder' from being surrounded by mountains and the sea.
